Child rights monitoring is a core role in UNICEF's Europe and Central Asia region and is increasingly becoming widespread in other regions. The incumbent will have the opportunity to support various workstreams of the unit and the section, and get exposed to UNICEF's work in different contexts while obtaining and developing his/her knowledge and technical skills in situation monitoring/data/CRM, all of which will be sound stepping-stone in future career with UNICEF in M&E, CRM or similar positions.



In his previous capacity as a Deputy Representative, in addition to supervising all the programme officers, he recruited and managed young fellows/interns working closely with HQ. in his current capacity, in addition to overseeing the work of the CRM unit and supervising the Data and Statistics Specialist, he led the establishment of UNV positions, their onboarding, planning and implementation of their workplans. He is also instrumental in managing the network of CRM-E specialists in 22 country offices.

II. Strategic Office Context and purpose for the job

The drivers of social exclusion will remain hidden from decisions makers while data inadequately interrogates 'who are the most deprived children, where they are in the society and why such deprivations are persisting'. The Sustainable Development Goals aspire to leave nobody behind. For data to drive the right decisions that leave no child behind, UNICEF in Europe and Central Asia (ECA) is taking advantage of its previous data footprints and partnership with National Statistics Offices to institute a culture of data mining beyond MICS, increase the rigour and reliability of administrative data systems to report on the coverage of key social services, support the analysis of routine information from multiple sources by countries to produce child deprivation profiles; promote national and local accountability for equitable social services for children through SDG and CRC commitments.

All 54 countries in Europe and Central Asia have received one or more recommendations from the Committee on the Rights of the Child to improve data, statistics and knowledge on children. Through its MICS programme, UNICEF ECA has been supporting the governments in the collection, disaggregation, and use of data through child-focused household surveys and through its regional TransMonEE initiative, UNICEF has fostered a network and platform of national statistical offices to improve administrative data on particularly situation analysis support to country offices and national governments.

The JPO Monitoring Officer will contribute to moving this agenda forward, continuing to advance child rights in Europe and Central Asia.

Strategic office context:

The Programme, Planning and Data Section at UNICEF is seeking donor support for the funding of a JPO position that will provide critical support to the multiple initiatives of the section for advancing its ambitious data for children agenda in the region that consists of 54 countries.

The section supports 22 country programmes implementing child rights monitoring/data programming while fostering partnerships and regional assets for the whole region to bring the data and analysis on children to the heart of the policy- and decision-making. Each country office has a Child Rights Monitoring and Evaluation Specialist position as the direct counterpart of the CRM work track, while most non-programme countries have a national committee for UNICEF that is also engaged in child rights advocacy work, many supporting the national partners in the development and monitoring of evidence-based child rights strategies. The Regional Office has also been working with countries towards developing systematic and sustainable platforms and discussions on the situation of children using the ECA Child Rights Monitoring Framework. The immense needs and opportunities require UNICEF to step up its data and statistics results.

Purpose for the job:

The JPO Monitoring Officer will work as part of the ECARO Programme, Planning and Data team and build on the existing regional assets for situation monitoring, strategic planning and knowledge management to ensure an efficient and integrated approach for advancing the pending recommendations of the CRC.

The JPO Monitoring Officer will specifically support the work on the situation analysis and coordinate support to monitoring frameworks of national child rights action plans.

III. Key functions, accountabilities and related duties/tasks:

- 1. **Situation Analysis.** Support the country offices and interested non-programme countries with the analysis of the situation of children along the spectrum of the initiation and conduct of the analysis with partners to the rolling (digital) situation analysis portals. This will also include a particular emphasis on working with countries/COs to strengthen the equity analysis and increased use of administrative/national data for triangulation and deepening the child rights analysis, potentially using APIs, AI and other advanced methods/technology.
- Monitoring frameworks for policies on children and indicator sets. Review the existing national
 frameworks for monitoring child rights, including the indicator sets used in formulating policies and
 implementation, and help facilitate knowledge sharing and support to interested countries/country
 offices in formulating such frameworks.
- 3. **Data communication**. Support the outward-facing interfaces of the section and the RO related to data dashboards, situation analysis and analytical reports, using innovative approaches and tools.
- 4. Knowledge Management. The Monitoring Officer will manage the Knowledge Management site in ECARO related to situation analyses and national monitoring frameworks for child rights. Identify best practices in setting and monitoring evidence- and equity-based national targets, as well as tracking of CRC recommendations. S/he will also support and facilitate knowledge exchange activities with other regions.

IV. Impact of Results

The technical and operational support will directly contribute to furthering the child rights monitoring agenda in the region and improving data/evidence and policymaking interface and linkages. This will enhance UNICEF's universal mandate and UN policies, specifically Agenda 2030 and the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC), which sets out the universal and indivisible rights that apply to every child.

Advnced skills (Python or R) is an asset. Exposure to UNICEF approaches to effective knowledge. management and sharing, preferably in a regional office setting, is an asset. Exposure to and knowledge of priority child rights issues in the region (e.g. child protection, migration, access to justice, the inclusion of minorities and children with disability, etc.) is an asset. Exposure to/knowledge of UNICEF or UN work (directly or as a partner) is an asset. Relevant experience in both development and emergency settings is an asset.
